Youth form teams and submit their best proposals to regenerate the urban areas













- No maximum number of team members.





Marlboro Station and surrounds







The selected site, Portion 1 of the Remaining Extent of the Farm Bergvallei 37 IR, is owned by the City of Johannesburg and approximately 14 hectares in extent.

The Jukskei River borders the site's western edge, whilst the Marlboro Gautrain Station on the southern edge.

Gautrain infrastructure is a massive investment that needs to be supported by appropriate densities and intensity.

The subject site is situated on the corner of the N3 Highway and Marlboro Drive. It is approximately 6.2km east of Sandton CBD and 20 km northeast of Johannesburg CBD. It is located in close proximity to the well-known township of Alexandra to the south.


Key Challenges

Spatial, socio-economic and environmental





The study area is currently faced with challenges such as growing informal settlements in flood-prone areas, land invasion, river pollution, a lack of walkable routes, inadequate housing and amenities, poverty, and environmental degradation.







City's Expectations: Redevelopment options

Students are expected to design green and thriving neighbourhoods that maximise environmental and social benefits – CoJ CAP (2021).

The overall design entries must advocate for a transit-oriented, polycentric city development model, with complete and self-reliant neighbourhoods – CoJ SDF (2016).

In a nutshell, Joburg explores how a TOD with an emphasis on climate change resilience may be a catalyst to address challenges faced by the area.

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
